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Apple Rings

1/2 cup brown sugar 3 cups plain flour

1 cup sugar 2 tsp.

1 stick margarine 1 cup Crisco shortening 2 cups water 8 to 10 Tbs. ice water

4 or 5 cups cooking apples, peeled and grated. Sugar and cinnamon, to taste.

Mix brown sugar, sugar, margarine and water in (10 x 14 in) baking pan and bake at 400° until bubbly hot. Stir to mix well. Remove from oven and reduce heat to 375°.

For pastry, add salt to flour. Cut shortening into flour mixture until resembles small peas. Add ice water, one tablespoon at a time, until dough begins to hold together. Roll out on well-floured board into a rectangle.

Add sugar and cinnamon to apples. Pour apples over dough and spread evenly; roll as for jelly roll. Cut into 1-inch wheels and drop into hot syrup. Bake at 375° for 35 to 40 minutes or until golden brown.

NOTE: May substitute two packages (prepared) Jiffy pie crust mix for pastry ingredients.

COLLECTING EVIDENCE AFTER AN INJURY

If you've just been injured in an accident, collecting and preserving evidence is critical. Here are some suggestions on what you can do to protect yourself.

■ Take Photos

If you're able to do so, take photographs with your phone while you're at the scene of the accident. Otherwise, go back to the scene as soon as you can and take photographs of anything that may have caused or contributed to your injury. Likewise, take photographs of your physical injuries so that you can show how your condition progressed.

Eyewitnesses

Find out if anyone saw you get injured or if someone knows about similar injuries that may have occurred at the same locations. Look for these potential witnesses as soon as possible to ensure their best recollection of the events.

■ Preserve Physical Evidence

Physical evidence can help tell the story of how you were injured. So before you get your damaged car fixed, be sure to get photographs of the vehicles. Keep the clothes you were wearing if they tell the story of how seriously you were injured.

■ Get Medical Treatment

It's important that you get treatment if you need it and that you don't delay getting it. The best way to prove an injury is to see a doctor so that you have an official medical record.

Protect Your Family – Be Insured!

Tennessee law requires you to carry liability insurance to cover injuries or damages you might cause to someone in a car wreck. The minimum amount of liability car insurance you can carry is \$25,000 for each injury per accident and \$50,000 for the total injuries per accident. But this only covers the injuries and damages you cause to someone else. This is the bare minimum of what you have to carry in order to drive legally.

If you want to protect your family beyond the bare minimum, you can purchase all kinds of other coverage. Collision coverage will fix accident-related damage to your car. Comprehensive coverage would fix your call after a hail storm. And Medical Payment coverage will pay some of your medical bills (usually up to a stated dollar figure) after a wreck.

But there are two other insurance coverages that are very important to have. Uninsured motorist coverage protects you when another at-fault and uninsured driver causes harm to you or your family. It can cover your lost wages, medical costs and other related expenses associated to your injuries. Underinsured motorist coverage protects you if are injured by another driver who only carries the bare-minimum insurance coverage. Their insurance might not be enough to pay for all the costs associated with your injuries. We recommend that you have a minimum of \$100,000.00 in coverage.
